#### **Seniors May Donate and Save Taxes**

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to St. Monica Church from your IRA could reduce your 2024 Taxable Income!

- · You must be at least 70½ when you request a QCD.
- · Funds must be transferred directly from your IRA custodian to St Monica Church.
- · A QCD will count toward your 2024 Required Minimum Distribution if the funds come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline (generally December 31 each year).

Consult your IRA administrator or financial advisor for details.

# Creation Corner

We all live in an urban environment and probably farming and all its intricacies are not subjects we think about every day. But check out this hopeful report.

According to Environment America, a surprising discovery planting strips of prairie alongside crops - can significantly reduce soil erosion. Iowa State University professor Lisa Schulte Moore says that planting these prairie strips next to corn, wheat, soybeans and other crops reduces erosion by 95%..The prairie strips are planted with a variety of native grasses, legumes, bush clover, coneflower, goldenrod, native sunflower and sedges such as Indian grass.

The strips do more. Environment America also reports that planting the prairie strips prevents fertilizer runoff by 90%. So, along with the immediate area, the strips protect the downstream landscape where runoff can harm plants and wildlife. What's more, the prairie strips provide habitats and foraging sites for pollinators such as butterflies and bees as well as birds, thus promoting their diversity.

Farmers have reported another effect on their communities. It's not only the bees visiting the prairie strips. Local students have asked to have their senior pictures taken with the vibrant and colorful native plants in the background. The next goal is getting to the point where planting prairie strips is common across the Midwest so more bees can buzz, monarchs can float on the breeze and the soil is rich and healthy.
