





Creation Corner

During the Advent season, the Creation Stewards team will share reflections on the topic of creation. Our first reflection is by former *National Catholic Reporter* editor and publisher Arthur Jones, published online in 2019 and based on Pope Francis's encyclical *Laudato Si': On Care for our Common Home*.

Lift Up Your Eyes:

Pope Francis is willing us to pay more attention to everything around us, and he brings in Jesus' eye for detail to emphasize the point.

"The Lord was able to invite others to be attentive to the beauty that there is in the world because he himself was in constant touch with nature, lending it an attention full of fondness and wonder. As he made his way throughout the land, he often stopped to contemplate the beauty sown by his Father, and invited his disciples to perceive a divine message in things: 'Lift up your eyes, and see how the fields are already white for harvest' (Jn 4:35). 'The kingdom of God is like a grain of mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all seeds, but once it has grown, it is the greatest of plants," (Mt 13:31-32).

The Pope continues:

"Jesus lived in full harmony with creation, and others were amazed: 'What sort of man if this that even the winds and sea obey him?' (Mt 8:27). His appearance was not that of an ascetic set apart from the world, nor of an enemy to the pleasant things in life. Of himself he said: 'The Son of Man came eating and drinking and they say, "Look, a glutton and a drunkard!' (Mt 11:19). ... In the Christian understanding of the world, the destiny of all creation is bound up with the mystery of Christ, present from the beginning: 'All things have been created through him and for him,' " (Col 1:16).

You, God, took a chance with creation. As you look now on creation and see how much it is despoiled, even after your Son redeemed humankind, is your creation more threatened than fulfilled? I should take some actions on Mother Earth's behalf. O God, let me cultivate ecological virtues.

SWEM really needs you to make a difference for our neighbors! The Christmas baskets are designed for families of 3 & 4 people, and for each basket, please provide the following:

- *Fruit cocktail or canned fruit
- *Soup (large can)
- *Fruit juice
- *Instant mashed potatoes
- *Large can of sweet potatoes (15oz)
- *2 canned vegetables
- *Cranberry sauce
- *Can gravy
- *Bag or box of stuffing (12oz)
- *Dessert (Jell-o, or pudding, or cake mix/ frosting, or pie crust/ & filling)

The baskets will be collected at St. Monica's, Dec. 14 & 15 30 minutes before the 4pm and 10:15am Masses at the garage near the Monica Street entrance to the parking lot.

A box will be available for submitting \$10 cash or a check written out to SWEM per basket to cover the cost of meat, eggs and margarine that SWEM provides.
