Creation Corner

One Square Foot

In the previous articles, we've emphasized how nature will heal itself once the damaging activity ceases. Where we have explored human intervention to help remediate problems, we have looked at the work of very small companies. This week, the focus is on a project jointly sponsored by AirWick and the World Wildlife Federation.

Since 2009, the Northern Great Plains have lost 33 million acres of wildflower and grassland habitat. These meadows and grasslands provide homes for pollinators and songbirds. They store and filter water within the soil, store carbon and build relationships with the environment through their root systems - relationships which often cannot be duplicated with non-native plants. So WWF and AirWick have teamed up to sponsor the OneSquare Foot initiative. The aim is to plant one billion square feet of wildflowers and grassland by 2024, principally in North Dakota and Montana. Fifty million square feet have already been planted.

Clay Bolt, a WWF official involved with the project says "Let's face it...pretty big issues...can feel too big to deal with. This initiative is really unique because it puts conservation back into the hands of individuals."

And this is where we come in. First, visit either the AirWick or WWF web site and sign up to receive a free packet of wildflowers native to our area. Whether we plant them in a pot, a yard or a field, the flowers will provide food for our local pollinators. Even one square foot makes a difference.

Secondly (and the order of these steps doesn't matter) post a photo, drawing, video of any wildflower to Instagram Facebook, Twitter or Pinterest with the hashtag #SquareFootSuperBloom by June 1. Then, AirWick and WWF will plant the additional square foot in the Great Plains.

This week in youth group and Faith Formation, we talked about homelessness: causes, stigmas, and solutions. Through Catholic Social Teaching, our faith teaches us to give special care to the poor and vulnerable in our world (Learn more: https://youtu.be/c3gxBjtOzNM)

We heard stories of those suffering in order to understand what they went through to be put in these situations - many have experienced trauma that we could never imagine. A 12-year-old girl whose mother chose a boyfriend over her daughter, forcing her out to the streets. A man who got beat up waiting for the bus and got hooked on the drugs the hospital used to treat his lifethreatening injuries. A mother fleeing an abusive situation with her two children. A senior who doesn't have enough money to pay rent, buy the medication he needs, and eat.

Stigma around homelessness can keep us from helping others, but it is most often situations outside of someone's control that cause them to become homelessness.

We discussed several organizations around Rochester that help people who need food or shelter, including Bethany House, House of Mercy, Open Door Mission, Saint Peter's Kitchen, Foodlink, REACH, St. Joseph's House of Hospitality. We were inspired by the example of St Francis Inn Ministries, a soup kitchen in Philadelphia that serves its guests restaurant-style: https://vimeo.com/42306390

The Inn is a reminder of what our faith teaches us to live out: all people have dignity regardless of race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, and life circumstances.

Homelessness and poverty are complicated issues affected by society, politics, economics, and individuals. But we decided this week that we can help by learning about the issues and spreading awareness. If you are at church this week, be sure to visit our mini-Cardboard City in the narthex created by our youth. The houses have messages of hope and encouragement, reminders that each person is a child of God. If you don't feel right about giving money, give a smile and acknowledgement. Give a list of resources that can help people (several listed here!). Volunteer at one of these awesome organizations. Write to your representatives for housing reform so people can afford rent. Above all, remember how blessed you are, and look for ways to spread those blessings to others. Thank you to all the amazing organizations and individuals who inspire us to be generous every day! God loves everyone, no exceptions!
