

Help End Human Trafficking

On February 8, we celebrated the feast day of St. Josephine Bakhita. Born in Sudan in 1869, she was kidnapped and sold into slavery as a child. For years, she was subject to terrible violence. Eventually she was "purchased" by the Italian consul and after some time was brought with him when he returned to Italy.



She was given to another Italian family who gave her the task of caring for their child. Both were sent to live with the Cannossian Daughters of Charity, who taught Josephine about Christ. Bakhita was baptized in 1890. When her "owner" came to retrieve her from the convent, she refused to leave. The sisters advocated on her behalf and a court case declared that Josephine was free, as slavery had been illegal in Sudan at the time of her birth and was illegal in Italy.

Bakhita entered the Cannossian order in 1893 and served her community for 42 years until her death in 1947. She was known for her gentle voice and smile, her forgiveness toward those who had enslaved her, and her good cheer even in the face of physical pain. She had a deep desire to bring God to those who did not yet know Him. St. Josephine Bakhita is the patron saint of the victims of human trafficking.
